## Books – Library and Book Depot

The library is run by Librarian Hanne Roed on school days between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. She will gladly help you, e.g. when you are writing your papers or the Extended Essay.

The storage of our books is in the basement. Use the stairs at the end of the glass corridor. It is run by Librarian Hanne Roed and the opening hours are Monday to Thursday during the 1st break.

The school lends you books without any costs, and it is your responsibility to take good care of them. If you lose a book or for other reasons do not return the books you have borrowed, you must pay for them.

Books are normally handed out to you by your teachers and you sign for them. If you are absent on the day a book is handed out in class, you must go to the book depot yourself to get the book.

When your teacher asks you to return a book, you hand in the book at the book depot and get a receipt. Save the receipt for all two/three years as it is your only proof that you have handed in the books.

## Café

In our café/canteen you can buy breakfast, warm dishes, salads and various sandwiches at reasonable prices. We want our canteen to be as green, organic and sustainable as possible. The canteen is usually open from from 8.15 - 8.45 a.m. and 9.45 a.m. - 12.40 p.m.

## Calendar - important deadlines

IB1 and IB2 students will be provided with a plan for Internal Assessment deadlines covering the 2 years of the Diploma Programme. This plan will be e-mailed to parents too.

## Cell Phones and Computers During Lessons

Please note the following special rules regarding cell phones and computers.

- The teacher will tell the students to deposit their phone in the class room

“Cell Hotel”. The phone will be handed back to the student when the entire lesson is over. The phones can be handed out to the students if it is part of the teaching.

- Using laptops is allowed, but they must be closed when a lesson begins. The teacher decides when PC's can be used during the lesson.

Under no circumstances must electronic devices be used for private matters during lessons, as stated clearly in the school code.

### **Change of Name and Address**

The office must be informed immediately of any changes regarding your name, address, phone number and e-mail. Also remember to inform us if your parents change these. You do this by sending the new info as a message in Open Apply or just come to the office.

### **Computers and Programmes**

The Danish Ministry of Education has decided that you may be required to buy teaching materials for up to DKK 2,500 during your time at STX, HF or IB. Grenaa Gymnasium does not enforce this rule, but in return expect students to buy the calculator recommended by your math teacher. We also recommend that you buy a laptop because many teachers require you to hand in assignments electronically. Exams in IB will be hand-written.

As a GG-student you have free access to:

- The entire Office Pack
- A wide range of software for subjects

### **Copies and Prints**

If you want to print or copy more than the 150 you get at the start of the school year, you can buy them via Studiz (see Studiz).

Please be aware that if you order prints/copies in color, the printer counts double.

Printing and copying for students is at the machine in the library.

### **Evaluations**

When the teachers give you feedback on assignments and performance it will usually not be in the form of a grade but as an evaluation that will guide you forward in your learning process. In the fall term, you will receive an evaluation on Lectio which describes strong and weak points in your academic status and which can be the starting point for a subsequent conversation with your teachers.

You will receive term grades on Lectio in February and as end of year grades in June.

### **Lectio – schedule, grades and absence**

We use a system called Lectio as our daily access to information about schedules and schedule changes. You can see e.g. which classes have been changed or cancelled. From the beginning of the school year, we “overbook” the timetable so you do not have to worry about getting enough lessons.

In Lectio you can also see your grades. This means that your term grades and end-of-year grades are not handed out to you on paper, but are made available electronically on Lectio.

Personal information, such as absence registration and grades, is accessible to each student with a personal password. This means that you, as parents, can see the grades through your son's/daughter, or you can ask your son/daughter to print the grades.

If you face any difficulties, please contact the school office (tel. +45 8758 4050) and we will send you a transcript, if your child is under the age of 18.

Finally, Lectio is the place to communicate with your teachers and coordinator. We expect you to keep yourself updated with messages and the timetable in Lectio by daily login.

## Lost Belongings

Clothes, shoes, bags, pencil cases, chargers, folders, etc. are placed in the brown cupboard in front of the ladies' room by the office. Jewellery, mobile phones and other valuables are handed in to the office.

## Meet and Greet

Your parents are invited to a virtual class evening in week 38. Your coordinator and counsellor will share information and introduce you to facts about the IB Programme at Grenaa Gymnasium. More info on how to join the meeting will follow.

## Morning Assembly

Once a week during the 10-break there is a morning assembly in the assembly hall. This is where students get practical information from the administration. You are more than welcome to participate, both if you understand Danish already or if you want to understand Danish better. Special IB-assemblies in English will be held once a month and we have student representatives who earn CAS-points by summarizing what happens at the weekly morning assemblies for the IB Morning Assemblies.

## Parties and Friday Cafés

The student party committee Olympos hosts app. 4 parties per year and the OD-group has 1 party.

For all parties you need to buy a ticket through our ticketing system – please read about the system: Studiz.

Friday Cafés are arranged by students approx. 5 times a year. Music Cafés are arranged by the music students 3 times a year.

Above all parties stands the traditional Gala Ball where students and teachers dress up and dance Les Lanciers.

## School trips

We aim to help you bond with your class mates and therefore you will experience a variety of intro activities during the first weeks.

Pre-IB students will spend 24 hours at a Nature Resort. The trip itself will be paid by the school but you must pay for the food yourself.

IB1's will spend a day together in a beach house.

In IB1 you will go on a study trip for 5-7 days.

The school may collect fees from you for participating in short excursions and the study trip which is considered part of the teaching. You can study the details on our website under Calendar/Study Trips and Excursions.

All payment for excursions and trips will go through Studiz.



## Smoking, Alcohol and Drugs

The school is smoke-free and smoking as well as use of other tobacco products is not allowed on the school premises.

Drinking alcohol or using drugs during school hours is forbidden, and you cannot be under the influence of alcohol or other drugs, cf. the school code.

## Student Card

You have to use the card as an identification card at all school parties. We are using the electronic student card Studiz, which you will always have handy (on your smartphone.)

You will set it up online via your uni-login (we will tell you more about this on the first day of school) and the student card will be valid through your entire time at GG. You will upload your picture to the electronic student card yourself. This can only be done once per year!

If you do not own a smartphone, you can get a printed plasticcard from the school's office.

## Study Plans [Studieplan]

In Lectio you can see an overview of your class study plan, that is, a plan for academic work undertaken in each subject and in courses involving several subjects, including a plan for your written assignments. Your written assignments are provided with a number of working hours [elevtid], meaning the amount of time you are expected to spend on each assignment.

## 'Studievalg Østjylland'

Studievalg Østjylland is a regional education and career guidance centre designed to guide you about further education after the gymnasium. At GG Cecilie Nesborg is in charge of informing students about their options, and she is the one you will be making appointments with. Through the website: studievalgweb.dk you can book an appointment with her and see when the next common meeting is going to take place.

## Studiz

When you need tickets for school parties or prints, we use a ticketing system called Studiz. You pay online and show your receipt at the office when you e.g. need prints. See this address: studiz.dk. Also you have a link on your front site in Lectio and at our website.

## SU

The quarter after you have turned 18 years old, you are entitled to receive SU, if you meet the requirements. You can apply one (three if you are a foreign citizen) month

in advance. Pick up a leaflet for guidance and help at the school office, or check out [grenaa-gym.dk](http://grenaa-gym.dk) or [su.dk](http://su.dk) and ask your councillor for help.

NOTE: Please read the rules carefully on [su.dk](http://su.dk) about applying on equal terms with Danish citizens, before you apply.

### **Transport**

No matter where you live, you have the right to receive a youth card [ungdomskort] which is a cheap bus/train card that offers you unlimited travel within a certain geographical area. Find more information on [ungdomskort.dk](http://ungdomskort.dk)

### **Tutors in Pre-IB**

Each Pre-IB class is given two tutors. Tutors are older students who are particularly concerned with helping you and your classmates settle in at the school. They have arranged your first day of school and are also in charge of arranging the intro arrangement for Pre-IB, 1st year STX, and 1st year HF. If you have any questions, you can always count on getting help from your tutors.

### **Well-being in the classroom**

Well-being in the classroom is a method that helps create a classroom culture in which everyone feels safe and welcome. You will be placed together with your classmates and be given a new “buddy” in your class every three weeks. Buddies help and keep an eye on each other to make sure that the buddy feels part of the class. As a part of the concept we introduce different activities to ensure that everyone gets the best possible start at GG.

## What we expect from students

- Take a genuine interest in school work and try to be open to new ways of learning. The learning environment and the teaching methods might be very different from what you are used to. It is always okay to ask if you are in doubt about what is expected from you.
- Make sure you get enough sleep, breakfast and lunch. It is not possible to learn if you are too tired or hungry.
- Come to all classes. Absence is only acceptable in case of illness. If – in very special circumstances – you would like to have time off from school, you need permission from the IB Coordinator.
- Study every day, especially for the exam assignments, so you do not fall behind. It is our experience that students who have good, regular study habits, do much better in their final exams. Academic skills are not enough but must be supplemented by hard work.
- All assignments must be handed in on time. You can always see the deadlines on Lectio. Quite a few assignments during IB1 and IB2 will count towards your final exam grade, which is why regular attendance is vital. Especially IB2 is quite full of internal assessment assignments.
- Make sure to contact the student counsellor if for some reason you fall behind or have other problems.
- We encourage you not to have a spare time job, especially in IB1 and IB2, as the work load will be too heavy for you.
- Make sure that holidays are held during the official school holidays except in very special circumstances. Cheap flight tickets are not a special circumstance. When you miss classes, you will have a hard time catching up as well as delaying the whole class in their learning process. Generally, the summer holidays do not begin until the final day of the school year. If you take time off for extra holidays without permission from the IB Coordinator, you risk expulsion.
- Be supportive of your fellow students in CAS-projects, group work, school events etc.
- Participation in mock exams is obligatory and non-negotiable. If you are ill, you must report to the school office. Otherwise you risk expulsion.
- We encourage you to participate in the study trip in IB1. The study trip is an important part of the IB education and includes important TOK field work, puts the academic work into context, and includes important IB Learner Profile skills. In special circumstances the study trip can be replaced by extra lessons at the school. If not attending in the study trip it is obligatory to go to school during the study trip week, as it is required by the Danish school law to give substitute lessons during the study trip week for students who cannot participate.
- Respect all genders, cultures, religions, and nationalities both in your own class and at the school in general. The IB encourages tolerance and we do not accept any anti-social behaviour at the school. This includes loud behaviour inside and outside the school. On excursions, be a good representative of our school.

- Respect and support the teachers in their work. Teachers and teaching methods differ, and it is your responsibility to adjust to them. In Denmark the lessons are evaluated between students and teachers at least once a year in order to ensure a good learning environment. It is always okay to ask questions in a polite way.
- Make sure to read and discuss the following which will also be presented by the school regularly during IB1 and IB2:
  - How to avoid plagiarism. Plagiarism will prevent you from getting your IB Diploma
  - The IB Learner Profile – how to become a life-long learner (A pamphlet about the IB Learner Profile is found on our homepage)
  - The School code (full version can be found on our homepage).

### **What we expect from parents**

- Make sure you read about the IB system on our school home page so you know about the education your child is taking. Moral parent support in your child's learning process is essential to a good result, even if you cannot help your child academically.
- If your child lives at home, help him/her by being interested in life at the school. If your youngster lives at the boarding school, make sure to have regular contact so you know how he/she is doing socially and academically. Living at a boarding school does not substitute parental support.
- If your child lives at home, help her/him to come to class every day. Absence is only acceptable in case of illness.  
If your child lives at home, encourage him/her to study every day, especially for the exam assignments. All assignments must be handed in on time. You can always see his/her deadlines on Lectio. Quite a few assignments during IB1 and IB2 will count towards the student's final exam grade, which makes regular attendance vital. Especially IB2 is full of with internal assessment assignments.
- Make room for the student to study and encourage her/him not to have a spare time job, especially in IB1 and IB2.
- A proper diet and enough sleep is essential for young adults' ability to learn. If your child lives at home, make sure he/she sleeps properly, gets a good breakfast and brings a lunch box.
- Make sure that holidays are held during the official school holidays except in very special circumstances. Cheap flight tickets are not a special circumstance. When students miss classes, they have a hard time catching up as well as delaying the whole class in their learning process. Generally, the summer holidays do not begin until the final day of the school year. If your child takes time off for extra holidays without permission from the IB Coordinator she/he risks expulsion
- Take an interest in your child's general well-being. In case of any major concerns, it is important that you communicate with the school.
- If possible, please attend for class evenings, parents' evenings, extra-curricular performances that your child participates in, and the graduation ceremony.

- Encourage your child to participate in all important CAS-initiatives, and all mock exams. Encourage him/her to participate in the study trip in IB1. The study trip is an important part of the IB education and includes important TOK field work, puts the academic work into context, and includes important IB Learner Profile skills. In special circumstances the study trip can be replaced by extra lessons at the school. If not attending in the study trip it is obligatory to go to school during the study trip week, as it is required by the Danish school law to give substitute lessons during the study trip week for students who cannot participate.
- Encourage your child's social skills and his/her respect for all genders, cultures, religions, and nationalities. The IB encourages tolerance and we ask you to support this as much as possible at home. We do not accept any anti-social behaviour at the school.
- Respect and support the teachers in their work. Make sure to read and discuss the following with your child:
  - o How to avoid plagiarism. Plagiarism will prevent you from getting your IB Diploma
  - o The IB Learner Profile – how to become a life-long learner (A pamphlet about the IB Learner Profile is found on our homepage)
  - o The School code (full version can be found on our homepage).

## School Code

We expect you to behave well when at school. Even so, we have a list of study and school rules which will be explained at the beginning of the school year. Read the full set of rules at [www.grenaa-gym.dk](http://www.grenaa-gym.dk). The most important rules are listed here:

You do your part to make the school a good place to work in and be at:

1. By showing others respect – both during lessons, when on excursions, during break times, and outside normal school hours.
2. By taking responsibility for your own behaviour and showing others consideration, both in class and socially.
3. By looking after the condition of the school buildings, furniture, and teaching materials, as well as helping to keep the school clean and tidy.
4. By avoiding noise and unnecessarily high levels of sound in school.
5. By accepting and respecting the following rules:
  - Mobile phones must be switched off and kept in your bags during lessons.
  - Laptops must be closed at the beginning of a lesson and may only be used if advised by a teacher.
  - It is strictly forbidden to take any form of euphoric drug on school grounds. Likewise, it is forbidden to turn up at school influenced by any such drug.
  - Drinking alcohol in school time is forbidden, as is turning up drunk for lessons. Alcoholic drinks are allowed on special occasions, but only when the School Management has given permission.
  - GG is no-smoking area, and smoking is not allowed during the schoolday.
  - Food and beverage is not permitted during lessons without the teacher's acceptance.

## Useful abbreviations and expressions

There are many new words and expressions to get used to when starting at a new school. We have prepared this list of useful expressions for you to guide you and your parents through the jungle:

AP	“Almen sprogforståelse”. A basic grammar course in the Danish STX system that all Pre-IB students must follow as well. The course in Pre-IB will focus on English grammar.
CAS	Creativity – Activity – Service. Part of the IB core and mandatory for all IB students.
EE	Extended Essay: A big assignment that you write by the end of IB1/ beginning of IB2. If you fail your EE, you will not get your IB Diploma.
GG	Grenaa Gymnasium.
HF	The 2-year upper secondary programme for Danish students.
IA	Internal Assessments. You have internal assessments in almost all of your subjects.
IB	International Baccalaureate. An academically demanding youth education upper secondary programme corresponding to a Danish “Studentereksamen”, but taught in English.
IB Coordinator	Head of the Pre-IB and IB programme.
IB Learner Portfolio	An individual collection of student work compiled during the two years of the course. A place for the student to explore and reflect on literary texts and prepare for assessment.
IB Learner Profile	A profile that all IB Students should strive to live up to. See the IB Learner Profile Booklet at our homepage. The students will be introduced to the IB Learner Profile regularly.
IO	Individual Oral: These count as parts of the IB-exams in the language subjects.
Lectio	Our timetable- and e-mail system in which you can also see absence, grades, exam time tables, and school events.
MCQ	Multiple Choice Questions. Used in the Group 4 science subjects as part of the exam.
NV	School abbreviation for Basic Science Course in Danish: “Naturvidenskabeligt grundforløb”. A science course during the first term of Pre-IB corresponding to the science course in the Danish school system.
OD-Day	The “Operation One Day’s Work” is a charity day for all students. The students get CAS-points for participating in a day’s work that help a school in a less fortunate part of the world.
P1, P2, P3	Refers to the different exam papers that you have to write in most subjects.
Pre-IB	The class before IB starts. Pre-IB is a Danish requirement which is why Pre-IB follows the Danish educational system while at the same time preparing for the IB class.

<b>Pre-IB Coordinator</b>	Coordinates activities and monitors the performance and wellbeing of Pre-IB students
<b>Student Counsellor</b>	Guides students in terms of educational choices. Also takes care of the well-being of each student. Students and parents can always contact the student counsellor. Any conversations with students are strictly confidential, also if a student is below 18. This is to ensure that the student can get help without involving e.g. teachers, parents or the IB Coordinator.
<b>STX</b>	The 3-year upper secondary programme in the Danish school system.
<b>Teacher Team</b>	Has the responsibility of the well-being of the students in each class. The Teacher Team runs a programme called "Netverk" is to ensure that no student feels isolated in class and that no bullying takes place.
<b>TOK</b>	Theory of Knowledge: A part of the IB Core. Students must write a big, externally moderated assignment and make an oral presentation to fulfill the requirements of the subject.

We thoughtfully consider the world and our own ideas and experience. We work to understand our strengths and weaknesses in order to support our learning and personal development.
